About the Course

Background

Clean Technology is commonly defined as a diverse range of products, services, and processes that harness renewable materials and energy sources, dramatically reduce the use of natural resources, and cut or eliminate emissions and wastes. Clean Technology includes a wide variety of environmental, social and economic activities predominantly comprising the fields of: clean production including green chemistry, resource efficiency including energy efficiency, renewable energy, information technology, green transportation, sustainable water technologies and green building. Investments in clean technology have grown considerably since coming into the spotlight around the year 2000. For example, the markets for clean energy technologies grew from less than \$7 billion in 2001 to over \$188 billion in 2010. This staggering increase is a result of the growing constraints on conventional economic growth due to environmental degradation, high oil prices, scarcity of natural resources and climate change. Therefore, some regard Cleantech as the beginning of a revolution that is changing the places where we live and work, the products we manufacture and purchase, and the development plans of cities, regional governments, and nations around the globe.

Many clean technologies also offer significant additional benefits, notably their ability to improve the lives of those in both developed and developing countries. Communities can be connected to electricity without the need to build a complex national grid, waste can be collected and turned into energy, and water can be purified to provide safe drinking water. Therefore, the realization of clean technology is twofold: technologies and implementation - utilizing a better understanding of socio-economic factors in the move towards sustainable development. The international training *Clean Technologies* – *Environmental technology, innovation and management systems as means for regional and local economic development* will emphasize for participants the importance of this two-pronged approach to the realization of clean technology, introduce and review a variety of clean technologies and illustrate implementation mechanisms such as: supportive policy and legislation, advocacy and promotion, the value of regional and international networks and the role of business development and entrepreneurship.

The Israeli Experience

Israel is a small, densely populated country with few natural resources. As such, Israel developed novel technologies for conservation, resource management and implementation mechanisms. Israel excels in innovative ideas and patents on new technologies. A recent international report by The World Wildlife Fund and the Cleantech Group (an environmental consulting company) ranked Israel second in providing favorable conditions for cleantech development.

The Methodology

Participants will participate in both classroom-based lectures (soft and hard skills) and study visits, benefiting from the experience and knowledge of high-level Israeli experts and consultants. Israeli case studies and practices will be discussed throughout the program. Additionally, participants will be required to formulate and present a project of interest relevant to the topic of this course. For this purpose, some pre-course work will be required. Detailed instructions will be sent to the selected participants.

- Provide participants with knowledge, tools and strategies related to clean technologies
- Inspire and energize participants to be agents for positive change in their countries
- Expose participants to new approaches and opportunities in the field of clean technology
- Present Israel as a case study from which to draw valuable lessons about clean technology
- Enrich participants with professional skills with which to develop their careers and best benefit their communities and countries
- · Connect participants with an international network of professionals in their field

Main Subjects

The program will provide participants with knowledge and tools in the following subjects:

- Policies and national programs for cleantech development
- Law and regulation implementation for renewable energy, energy efficiency and water conservation
- Advocacy for and promotion of cleantech
- Platforms, networks and cooperation for new technology implementation at the regional level
- Innovation support systems, SME and entrepreneurship support for cleantech development
- The Israeli experience and Israeli cleantech startups and companies in water technologies, energy technologies, waste management, recycling and waste to energy programs

The training targets highly motivated decision makers, policy makers and professionals from the fields of energy, water, waste, agriculture, climate change, infrastructure and economic development, those working in government ministries (such as local government, planning, development, energy and others), in local authorities, NGO's and CBO's active in the field of entrepreneurship and startup, venture capital funds, business organizations, and academic institutions engaged with cleantech and entrepreneurship programs.

Background

Farming accounts for around 70% of water used in the world today. Having to face climate changes, increasing periods of negative water balance and constantly rising water demand by urban and industrial sectors, countries will be forced to implement irrigation systems in order to promote efficient use of water and ensure sustainable development of their agriculture and improve the living conditions of rural population.

For Israel, water has always represented a chronic problem. Located in an arid - semiarid region, Israel addressed the constraints of limited water resources by consolidating its policy of national water management system and invested great efforts in research and development of agro - technologies that ensure efficient use and management of its scarce water resources.

Implementation of pressure irrigation technologies since the 50's fundamentally changed traditional agricultural practices, boosting the development of a modern and highly productive agriculture.

Drip irrigation and fertigation, agro-techniques that allow supply of water and nutrients according to the demand of the crop, have contributed to transforming land incapable of being cultivated into productive farmland, substantially increasing crop yields while reducing water and fertilizers consumption, as well as promoting reuse of treated waste and marginal water and protection of the environment.

The constant search for greater efficiency in the use of water and nutrients is a challenge for those involved in the sustainable development of agriculture and the well-being of the farmer and his environment.

About the Course

Aims

The training program aims to share with participants Israel's acquired experience in the development of intensive and profitable agriculture, based on efficient water management and the implementation of irrigation and fertigation systems adapted to the different crops.

The course will also serve as a platform for discussing the application of the latest methods and technologies in the unique conditions of each participating country.

Main Subjects

The course will include professional lectures and field visits. It will cover the following topics:

- Management of water resources
- Crop water and nutritional requirements
- Water quality and treatment
- Fertilizers and nutrient solutions
- Fertigation programming and monitoring
- Applied irrigation and fertigation technologies
- Research and development

Application Requirements

The course is geared towards professionals from governmental and non-governmental institutions, universities, research institutes and/or private sector involved in agricultural development projects under irrigation as well as in research, extension and / or intensive agricultural production. Candidates should hold an academic degree in related disciplines and at least two years of professional work experience in related fields. A full command of English is required.

About the Course

Background

"Children are not the people of tomorrow, but people today. They are entitled to be taken seriously. They have a right to be treated by adults with tenderness and respect, as equals."

Janusz Korczak

Within the framework of the 2030 education agenda, many stakeholders are advocating for the introduction of a **learning-related goal** as the most appropriate way to monitor educational progress and the prevention of early dropout rates and reducing inequality.

A range of interventions aimed at expanding access and improving quality have helped to reduce dropout. Accessibility initiatives have been created in terms of improving quality, as well as initiatives to improve teacher training and support, provide relevant and modern learning materials and integrate technology and gender-sensitive practices.

Yet school dropout remains a persistent concern. This goal presents a great challenge that must be met with creativity, resourcefulness and hard work.

One of the targeted populations within the stated goal is at-risk youth. This label - given by various authorities (psychologists, educators, and sociologists) - refers to vulnerable adolescents from all socio-economic backgrounds for whom normal family life has been disrupted, and who lack sufficient parental or adult interaction.

For those young people, the educational system takes on a special significance. Therefore, it is especially crucial to create educational opportunities to widen access to education. These children must integrate into schools and training programs as quickly and as fully as possible, so they can have multiple opportunities for meaningful learning experiences.

However, "access" is complex and multifaceted. The professional educators who constantly mediate between students and the world around them must be supportive and caring when working with this special-needs group. Educators must create opportunities and impart skills, competencies and attitudes that will enable these adolescents to be productive and resourceful members of society.

Every nation today is involved in the challenging process of providing quality education to meet the new demands of the 21st century. Educational systems have to develop innovative outreach programs for these school dropouts, focusing all efforts on creating positive conditions and individual skills that will foster resiliency and offset risk factors.

Given Israel's many national responsibilities – including the absorption of massive numbers of immigrants from various countries and cultures, while simultaneously dealing with emergencies – its instructional and educational personnel have an important and highly complex role.

Israel has achieved considerable progress in increasing the number of students between the ages of 12-18 who attend high school. However, despite Israel's Ministry of Education's policy for the prevention of student dropout and the development of special and varied curricula, some of these young people have not been successfully integrated into the existing system. In order to deal with this challenge and its ramifications, the Ministry has made strides in the field of youth advancement, via the development of the Youth and Society Administration. This section in the

Ministry works toward developing and advancing the educational-remedial services for those students that have dropped out of formal educational frameworks.

The course designed by the Aharon Ofri MASHAV International Educational Training Center is aimed at directors of education departments in Ministries of Education, supervisors of primary and secondary schools; Teacher Training institutions, whose responsibilities involve the allocation of resources and development of educational policies.

This program is conducted within the cooperation of UNESCO- Participation Program and Fellowships Section and MASHAV sponsorship of Israel's Agency for International Development Cooperation (MASHAV), a department in Israel's Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

The course is based on the vast experience the Israeli education system has acquired over the years in working towards an educational environment contributive to sustainability and globalization, with a tailored approach that can be instrumental in keeping kids in school and ensuring that they are equipped for success in tertiary education and a meaningful life.

Aims

To train participants to successfully:

- Create a relationship of mutual trust with youth in order to enable their reintegration into the educational system
- Help individual youths develop and realize their potential so that they may help themselves and their society
- Reduce alienation from the community and society
- Plan educational services and interventions for youths at ages 12-18 considered at-risk according to the following characteristics:
 - Detached youths who do not study or work in a formal or informal educational framework
 - Working youth who do not have a supportive educational framework
 - Youth at risk who commit open or clandestine crimes
 - High-risk youth needing individual and ongoing support in areas including completing their education, job placement, and personal and social skills
- Raise multicultural awareness in those working toward the advancement of disadvantaged youth
- Provide tools and guidelines for curricular development
- Advance teaching methods for specific subject matter (such as science and language arts),
 as well as interdisciplinary subject areas
- Train and advance educational staff and support them in sustaining their duties and promoting their programs
- Enable participants to choose the methods and tools suitable to the particular needs of their environment
- Provide a basis for future training activities according to the needs of the different countries and institutions

The A. Ofri International Training Center established in 1989 as a professional extension of MASHAV - Israel's Agency for International Development Cooperation. The activities are targeted to meet the Global Sustainable Development Goals 2030 (SDGs).

The Center's vision is that education is the starting point for a person to build himself/herself a gate to new possibilities. Education is the key to a better future and shields against physical harm and confronts moral dilemmas. Education enables us to ask for proper healthcare when needed, and the way to stay healthy and adopt responsible behavior with our bodies. Education is sharing, learning and growing up together with others. Through education, we can learn to take better care of our world, treat it respectfully and use wisely the resources it offers us.

Education concerns itself with learning at all levels, from elementary and secondary school through adult education, and provides knowledge and training for basic skills development, civic awareness, community education, education for special populations, treatment for youth (including those at risk), youth integration, youth leadership, education for health and the prevention of drugs abuse.

About the Course

Background

Israel is a leader in the development and production of new crop varieties that are suited to a variety of climatic conditions, are resistant to disease, and are able to maintain quality after harvest during both storage and marketing. Israeli innovations range from saucer-shaped yellow zucchinis to black watermelons to specialized wheat grains to sunflowers for decoration and confection. Each year Israel exports over \$70 million in vegetable seeds to consumers all over the world.

Seed production in Israel is supported by highly comprehensive research and development. In addition to improving conventional farming methods, researchers have developed environmentally-friendly and organic management practices for seed production, treatment, and storage. About the Course

Background

In September of 2015, the General Assembly adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which is based on the principle of "leaving no one behind". The new agenda emphasizes a holistic approach to achieving sustainable development for all. We should also keep in mind that it is the result of a political agreement, and that constant vigilance will be required now and in the future to avoid human rights violations, especially for the most discriminated groups, such as people with disabilities, people with intellectual and psychosocial disabilities, or people living in conflict-affected areas.

The development of each and every country is based on the education of its people, and the education is based on the development of the country. The highest responsibility of each educational system is to provide education and high quality teaching for all students. In the case of Special Education, the subjects do not need to be changed, but a program should be tailored for each student, as well as the teaching methods, in order to enhance the student's strengths and help him/her to overcome difficulties. The SDGs also promote Inclusive Education, which means that students with special needs are placed (when possible) in "regular schools" instead of segregated institutions, in order to empower the child with special needs to be an active part of society. It also teaches the "regular students" to understand what the needs of their peers with different impairments are; it fosters equality, respect and solidarity. Imagine the world in 2030, fully inclusive of persons with disabilities.

Under the title "Special Education and Inclusive Education" we can find a variety of theories, systems and ways of working, depending on the needs of the people who are included in these programs. a process of addressing and responding to the diversity of needs of all learners through inclusive practices in learning, cultures and communities and reduction of exclusion within and from education.

In order to develop the skills, experience and confidence to be inclusive of all children, teachers need to learn about and practice inclusive education, and they need to be given opportunities for continuing professional development throughout their careers.

The goal of the course is to introduce the educators to the ways Israel copes with the subject and to the different ideas and ways of working with students with special needs. The course aims to empower the participants as role models with specific seniority, experience, leadership, full understanding of the subject and training.

In the process of planning the course we considered the newest and most accurate contents and processes going on in the Israeli Educational System as well as international aspects.

Addressing the Urbanization Challenge

About the Course

Background

Cities are currently home to majority of the world's population. Over the next 30 years most of the two-billion-plus person increase in global population is expected to occur in urban areas in the developing world. If well managed, cities offer opportunities for economic and social development. Cities have always been focal points for economic growth, innovation, and employment. Cities are also centers of modern living, where indicators of general health and wellbeing, literacy, women's status, and social mobility are typically highest. While cities command an increasingly dominant role in the global economy, rapid urban growth throughout the developing world is seriously outstripping the capacity of most cities to provide adequate services for their citizens. Of particular concern are the risks to the immediate and surrounding environment, to natural resources, to health conditions, to social cohesion, and to individual rights. For many observers, however, the greatest concern is surely the massive increase in the numbers of the urban poor. Many of these urban poor are living in informal settlements made up of informal housing, often called slums. According to UN-Habitat, there are 823 million people living in slums worldwide. An estimated 72% of the urban population of Africa now lives in slums. The proportion is 43% for Asia and the Pacific, 32% for Latin America, and 30% for the Middle East and Northern Africa.

Slums and the complex web of challenges causing their existence and resulting from their existence is one of the greatest challenges faced by decision makers in the urban sphere. The international training *Addressing the Urbanization Challenge* is designed to empower participants to develop a comprehensive approach to addressing urbanization challenges – one that maintains financial and management mechanisms while integrating land use planning, construction of infrastructure, stimulation of economic growth, provision of social and health services, promotion of social cohesion and environmental protection.

The Israeli experience

Israel, one of the most urbanized countries in the world (with an urbanization rate of nearly 92%), has gained extensive experience in both the revitalization of poor urban areas and the integration of immigrant social groups from various backgrounds and origins. Though slums and poor urban neighborhoods in Israel are different from those in developing countries, the accumulated Israeli knowledge on the approaches, strategies and tools to deal with these challenges is relevant for participants.

Aims

The course aims to:

- Provide participants with knowledge, tools and strategies related to addressing urban challenges
- Inspire and energize participants to be agents for positive change in their countries
- Expose participants to new approaches and opportunities in the field of addressing urban challenges
- Present Israel as a case study from which to draw valuable lessons about addressing urban challenges
- Enrich participants with professional skills with which to develop their careers and best benefit their communities and countries
- Connect participants with an international network of professionals in their field

Main Subjects

The program will provide participants with knowledge and tools in the following subjects:

- Concepts in urban planning for development (land use and infrastructure planning; financial, management and organizational tools; urban branding; the triple bottom line & sustainability, assetbased development)
- Slum upgrading and migration to the city
- + Housing (inclusionary zoning, project renewal, public housing)
- + Stimulating economic growth (LED local economic development; support systems for innovation, entrepreneurship and SME's; conservation of the built heritage; PPP's public-private partnerships)



About the course

Background

In cooperation with the Hebrew University of Jerusalem's Faculty of Agriculture – MASHAV's only academic affiliate – we are pleased to announce the opening of a training and capacity building program on NUTRITION IN A CHANGING GLOBAL ENVIRONMENT.

The course will be held in Israel at the Robert H. Smith Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Environment, International School of Agricultural Sciences, in Rehovot from, August 27, 2017- September 19, 2017.

AIMS

Major changes have occurred in the global diet. In the past, malnutrition and infectious diseases were of primary concern. They remain a challenge, but today we also face an emerging trend towards over nutrition and chronic diseases (cardiovascular, diabetes, cancer). Nutrition transition has made fast-food, high in fats and simple sugars, the preferred menu for millions of individuals around the world and in particular for growing percentages of populations in developing countries. More and more processed foods are available and foods made from natural, locally-grown produce are disappearing. As we better understand how diet affects our health, it is clear that drastic dietary changes must be made.

First, the physiological needs of each age group must be understood, followed by appropriate dietary recommendations that will promote good health. It is also evident that exposures throughout the lifespan, including in utero, affect long term health. Health professionals should have the tools to carry out critical evaluation of the most recent nutritional studies and implement appropriate changes in the community. "Informed" food choices based on sound scientific evidence can insure good nutrition for all.

OBJECTIVES

The program's objectives are:

- To provide an overview of the nutritional needs of different populations.
- To understand current nutritional guidelines established to provide optimal dietary intake for all age groups.
- To critically examine how nutritional recommendations are made and to evaluate epidemiological and clinical evidence.
- To understand the lifespan approach to nutrition.
- To discuss emerging trends in modern nutritional sciences.
- To develop new tools for implementing nutritional recommendations.

MAIN SUBJECTS

This program's topics of study will include:

- Nutrition throughout the life-cycle: infants, children, adolescents, mothers, adults and the elderly.
- Understanding evidence-based nutrition.
- The obesity epidemic.
- The Microbiome and health.
- Fetal Programming.
- Functional Foods.
- Nutragenomics- how nutrients interact with genes.
- Supplementation and fortification.
- Nutrition in chronic disease.
- Nutrition transition.

STUDY CONDITIONS

Classes will be held at the Faculty's Rehovot campus, where there are laboratories, advanced research equipment and the central library of Agricultural Science.

Participants are advised to bring with them digitalized data relevant to their countries. On completion of the course and fulfillment of its requirements, participants will receive certificates, which will be accredited by many universities.

Requirements

Candidates interested in attending this program require:

- M.Sc. degree or above in nutrition, dietetics, medicine, bio-chemistry, health education, or a related field, from a recognized university. (A detailed record of studies and copies of degrees must be included with application forms.)
- Documentation of academic studies conducted in English OR a TOEFL score of at least 89 on the internet-based scale OR an internationally recognized equivalent. (The language of instruction is English, Therefore, participants whose native tongue is not English, must furnish proof of proficiency in this language.)
- Professional experience in the field is recommended (at least 3 years).
- This course is designed for public health practitioners, nutritionists, dietitians, health educationists, and academicians in relevant fields.
- An official certificate of good health signed and stamped by a doctor.
- Two letters of recommendation are required from the candidate's place of work or university.

About the Course

Background

Ecosystem services are defined as the benefits provided by ecosystems to humans.

Ecosystem services are commonly valued in ecological, economic or social terms. They have emerged as a prominent conceptual link between environment and society. Ecosystem services have managed to bridge the gap between nature conservation for the sake of nature and the concern for people's welfare. The argument for the protection of species and ecosystems can also be made in terms of the role of ecological systems in sustaining people's livelihoods and quality of life. Understanding how protection and proper management of ecosystems benefits society is important to professionals who work in environmental management because it provides them with tools to communicate this importance to stakeholders and the public. It has been shown that when the public understands the value of ecosystems, it is easy to gain the support that is so vital to nature conservation.

This training program, to be held at the Arava Institute for Environmental Studies located on Kibbutz Ketura in the south of Israel, provides an opportunity for mid-level professionals to gain knowledge about the basics of environmental management and ecosystem services. The primary topics include the principles of ecosystem management, ecosystem services and their value. We will teach participants the vocabulary and tools to work with government offices and ministries. Our course will include lectures and seminars from ecologists, nature reserve rangers, economists, sociologists and representatives from the Israeli Ministry of Environmental Protection.

The training program will utilize the extensive knowledge of the Arava Institute Center for Hyper Arid Socio-Ecology. In this course we will explain how arid lands function and what services they provide. We will teach what ecosystem services are, give examples of how they benefit society and how better management of ecosystems benefits societies. We will discuss different management styles with an emphasis on biosphere reserves. We will show how ecosystem services can be assessed, valued, priced and be translated to management practices. We will focus on the differences in management between several types of eco-systems. The course format will also include elements of renewable energy use, sustainable agriculture and water resource management in the framework of the whole life cycle approach of the Arava Center for Sustainable Development.

Aims

- Understand the concept of ecosystem services, its terminology, the division into categories, and its ecological, anthropological and economic aspects
- Learn how to build a management scheme based on the Ecosystems Services concept
- Assess Ecosystem Services values under different circumstances and scenarios of park management
- Learn the concept of a biosphere reserve and its management
- Learn about off-grid technologies as supporting tools in the operation and management of biosphere reserves
- Learn about the concept of ecosystem integrity
- Learn the DPSIR model and how to use it for management of nature reserves, parks and other public areas.
- Understand the structure and function of arid land ecosystems and use desert ecosystem integrity as a case study
- Understand the pressures and conflicts on arid lands
- Learn to teach rangers, government officers, and the public about Ecosystem Services
- Prepare a park management plan based on the Ecosystem Services Principle

Main Subjects

- Review of the principles and concepts of Ecosystems
- Using an Ecosystem Services approach to understand the importance of nature to human society
- The study of human-nature interactions including the conflicts of nature conservation and management
- Looking at the Israeli model of nature reserves and biosphere reserves in solving human-nature tensions
- Gaining the necessary tools for the management of ecosystems, including financial aspects
- Using a life cycle approach to resolve human-nature tensions

Application

Application Requirements

The target audience for this training program is individuals who are interested in expanding their knowledge and initiatives into ecosystem management, environmental economics, and environmental management.

This training program is intended for mid-level professionals involved in nature preservation, working for government, non-governmental organizations, decision-making bodies, academia and the private sector.

It will be especially beneficial to heads of rural councils and environmental officers of rural councils, government officers of environment and tourism ministries, biosphere reserve managers, park managers and rangers.

The program will be conducted in English. It is essential that the participants have a high level of reading, writing and speaking in English.

Competition for the MASHAV Courses is merit-based and selection will be made on the basis of academic excellence, professional aptitude, leadership potential in the field of Environmental Management and Ecosystem Services, and knowledge of English.

Funding for the MASHAV Courses is limited and the program is highly competitive; not all qualified applicant will receive awards.
